# It Was More Than A Mirage

It was Vegas, baby! Specifically, the Bankruptcy Software Specialists (BSS) 27th Annual Chapter 13 Bankruptcy Seminar. Headquartered at the Mirage Hotel, in the heart of the famous Las Vegas Strip, this year's seminar did not disappoint.

The Mirage is a beautiful hotel with fabulous meeting facilities, restaurants, nightclubs, a casino and a volcano that erupts nightly! All of our needs were met in this one location

and there was no need to venture out of the hotel, except to soak up some desperately-needed sun or to experience the sights and sounds of the Strip.

Tuesday morning the seminar opened with continental breakfast, opening remarks from Marty Quinn, and a humorous welcome from the host trustees Rick Yarnall and Kathleen Leavitt. We took the oath "What happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas," so I probably shouldn't describe the "personal assistants" that accompanied the trustees to the podium.

Traditionally, the first session provides an overview of new features of the TNG software. This almost acts as a commercial for the later breakout sessions and allows the attendees to zero in on the workshops that they will want to attend. Before the overview provided by Rusty Short, Dixon Stuart and Rick Wherry, we were treated to a clever animated short film that Rusty put together.

After lunch I was ready to get down to the nuts and bolts of the conference and planned to attend Rusty's session on Task Workflow. The session was titled "Task Workflow and the New User InBox Part I" and I stayed for "Part II" immediately following.

In my March 2011 Marshall Chronicles article, I wrote about the way we will be handling the Post-Confirmation Review process in the new system. This is Workflow. We have the ability to create tasks such as claims that need to be entered or cases that need to have PCR done, and these will show up in the user's inbox and they can process them from there.

Not every Workflow Task needs to end up in a user's inbox

to be processed. Sometimes we just want the system to execute an Update String or set of code based on certain criteria. Rusty's example was to send an email to debtors thanking them for their recent payment. Crazy, huh? But Rusty's job is to provide us with the tools, give an example and then see how far each office will run with it.

Rusty presented this concept to the group, and since we are already utilizing this in TNG (as guinea pigs?) I was able to follow along.

It's interesting to hear other peoples' takes on the material present-

ed, to see how they think they can benefit from this feature in their offices.

The final session for Tuesday was called "Program Automation Leads to Relaxation." Also taught by Rusty, this class showed how to set up programs and update strings to run by scheduling execution via the Windows Task Scheduler. This means we can run programs like Closing Date Calculation, Payee Step Payment Update and the Unsecured Percent Calculation automatically overnight when no one is on the system.

Whether it's training in Memphis or the annual bankruptcy seminar, BSS is not going to let you go hungry. Tuesday evening's



On Wednesday morning I returned to yet another Rusty class called "Case Worksheets – Beyond the Basics and More Part I." Since I have built some worksheets, I was excited to learn of any new developments in the product. Most of the features we learned about will be available with Version 8 of TNG. Our office gets to be one of the beta testers for Version 8. Right away, I know I will be utilizing the math functions of Case Worksheets. Prior to Version 8, there was not a way to perform math functions on information entered by users in the worksheet. But now because they have incorporated field validation, this is possible. I can beef up the Attorney Review Sheet worksheet that I started.



Next, I finally moved out of Rusty's classroom and joined Adrienne Starke for "ECF Auto-Filing in TNG." You may remember Adrienne was here last fall to help me with Crystal Reports. Her session showed the ins and outs of writing an update string that will allow us to automatically file events on the court's website.

After lunch Rusty had another session on ECF filing called "Auto-Filing ECF Documents – You Are Now in Control" that explained how we can now have tables in TNG that pass parameters to the auto-filing program. Before Version 8, any hiccups or changes in screens at the court's website required someone from BSS to change the auto-filing program on our system. With Version 8, these changes can be made by each individual office.

In our office we do restrict social media sites and others. Some of Tom's other suggestions included distributing the office computer use policy annually and having employees sign off on it and creating separate user accounts for users that access banking sites. Did you know that when you activate GPS photo tracking on your phone that you may be inviting predators to know where your kids are?

Next, I enjoyed another session with Adrienne called "Advanced TNG Reporting and Update Strings." Adrienne showed how we can now report on fields that are entered in Case Worksheets. She also demonstrated how to put links to documents right in a report. I thought of the Adequate Protection report that Rita and Ms. Marshall review every month during disbursement week. I can put hyperlinks to the modified plans so they will be able to open the documents up as they review. Another cool thing that Adrienne showed us incorporated the new Task Workflow module that I mentioned earlier. A user's in-box can display a link to a document that was received on a case up for a §341 meeting or confirmation hearing within a



certain number of days. This will prioritize processing of documents that need to be handled more urgently.

Wednesday night the group was invited to "Shake the Blues with Blues and BBQ Reception" at B.B. King's Blues Club in the Mirage. We danced to an excellent live band and enjoyed, of course, ribs!

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### **Trustee Matters**

### When Is The "Go Live" Date?

I was asked that question at the BSS Annual Seminar in Las Vegas at least 50 times. I am accustomed to the question, since Scot Turner, who is our hardware consultant and IT Manager for Rick Yarnell, asks the same question during our Thursday update calls. It has become a standing joke and part of the punch line for each call. My answer is always the same: "When the trust funds are balanced." I guess, since I attended the seminar for the last two years and said I was converting, everyone is wondering why is it taking so long. Trustee Glenn Stearns warned that it would be a long process and even though our situation is different from Stearns', in that I am converting from a homegrown system, CaseNET, to BSS-TNG and he converted from BSS-TOG to BSS-TNG, converting software is no easy task.

First of all, I am in no hurry to "go live" until I am sure that we will be able to perform the same tasks we perform today in our current system. Since the Chapter 13 Handbook for Trustees states that "the United States Trustee does not endorse or recommend any particular computer system or provider, but only require that the standing trustee should automate the chapter 13 financial reporting, accounting, and case administrator systems," it is very important to me that I am in compliance with the handbook.

Since CaseNET is a homegrown system, there was no annual seminar to attend. The only networking I would do was with the people in my office. So, I get so excited at the seminars because I want all of the things they are showing as part of the new version. It is like going shopping. I want one of this and one of that and maybe two pair of those shoes but in different colors. At the BSS-TNG seminar, I am windowshopping and none of the stuff I want is available. I want to be able to view my cases and work on the software on my Apple iPad. Of course, Rick and Mark from BSS-TNG demonstrated how it is done, but, that is a part of Version 8 and it is still being tested, therefore, it is not available yet. Andy, from Kathleen Leavitt's office, showed me how I would have to go to Setting, then General to make sure the VPN was set up so that the connection would be secure, but until BSS-TNG roles out this version, I still cannot use it. I was running

around collecting telephone numbers from IT managers of other offices so that I could contact them whenever I had a question, not because I needed a prom date. I got Andy's number from Vegas, Carl's from Detroit, Marco's from Chicago, Eric's from Georgia, Alvin's from Memphis, Bill from Mis-



souri and many others. It is amazing to see how many resources are available and how willing everyone is to assist.

Of course, some of the "cool features" in Version 8 are currently a part of our old software, so, those were not new to me but will definitely add enhancements to BSS-TNG. Now that I have witnessed all of the "bells and whistles" in Version 8, I am more determined than ever to complete the conversion. I am happy to report that the differences in our book balances have all been identified and now the focus is making sure the bank balance is the same.

Everyone understands that I must have a training manual prepared for my staff with documentation on how each task is performed. Rick Fink, Chapter 13 Trustee, Kansas City, Missouri, and Kathy Fink, his office manager, have the document similar to what I need to develop but since all trustee offices operate differently, I can use part of the skeleton of their document with Rick's permission, but I still have to document our processes. Their session presented at the seminar was one of the best.

Then there is the task of training the staff and having them perform each task. My staff understands that change is coming and we do not spend time talking about the past but welcome big and better methods of doing the work. I have already taken steps to train each department and as each person logs into BSS-TNG, hopefully, the users will have great ideas on how we can further develop the training and make it fun.

Lastly, I will have to educate the debtor and creditor bar on how to get the most from the new system. The interface with external users is phenomenal, and I will ensure that external users also feel comfortable with the new software.

So, when will we "go live?" Definitely, before the 2012 Annual Seminar to be held in Memphis, Tennessee.

Checklists and Worksheets" which was an informative session by Richard and Kathy Fink of Richard Fink's Trusteeship in Kansas City.

The very last session of the seminar for me was presented by Dixon Stuart and called "13software.com – Online Customer Help Portal." Dixon demonstrated the new website that will be our means of communicating with BSS regarding bug reports and fixes and a central location for offices to view BSS's online documentation.

Training like this really provides a shot in the arm for those of us on the development team. I am excited to beta test Version 8 of TNG and implement all the cool things I saw! Thanks, Ms. Marshall, for sending me to Vegas for a week. I thoroughly enjoyed it.

## Case Administration BSS Training – Vegas Style

In January of this year I received an e-mail from Ms. Marshall that in May I would be attending the Bankruptcy Software Specialists (BSS) 27th Annual Chapter 13 Bankruptcy Seminar training in Las Vegas NV. The temperature outside was in the single digits, so needless to say I was excited about the possibility of being anywhere warm. The training was for three days and BSS presented approximately 23 different workshops, which highlighted revisions to the software that will be rolled out this July. The workshops ranged from nontechnical to extremely technical, so there was something for everyone at any level in the office. There was representation from several trusteeships but I was surprised to learn that some are still on the old version of the software called TOG, so some of the information was probably more foreign to them than me. In preparation for our conversion Ms. Marshall brought in BSS personnel last year to do some in-house training and we also have the ability to log-in to BSS and practice some of the work tasks, so this allowed me to follow along in most of the workshops.

In one of the workshops titled "Development and Standardization of Operational Procedures, Checklists and Worksheets" the emphasis was on making sure everyone in the office is on the same page and has the ability to access information related to individual job tasks. This is mainly accomplished through documentation and communication. As we go through the conversion process, all procedures must be documented and tested by each user. You will be able to view written procedures from the BSS home page under your community events whenever you have a guestion. This will eliminate the "I didn't know or I didn't get a copy of that" as a reason for why you didn't follow a process. BSS will also send alerts when documentation needs to be updated or revised as changes occur in the system, which will help us keep the documentation current. No more hitting the document snooze button!!

TNG also has safeguards in the system and this workshop mainly focused on the financial area. Safeguards are similar to the dialog boxes we have in CaseNET that basically keep you from making common mistakes. Keep in mind you still need to pay attention to detail and utilize the alerts as an aid.



The ECF auto-filing feature will also be a plus for our office because we will have the ability to batch file motions instead of individually. We will also have the ability to e-mail documents within the TNG system and develop tickles for items that require additional follow-up.

After the rigorous training sessions, BSS hosted a welcome reception on Tuesday night at the exclusive Jet Nightclub located in the Mirage Hotel. On Wednesday night we gathered at the B.B. King's Blues Club for some great entertainment, delicious food and drinks. My husband's new quote is "Ain't no party like a Chapter 13 party!"

I met so many great people who were more than willing to share information, and I also had the opportunity to visit the office of Kathleen Leavitt. Her staff was very generous with their time, and I appreciate the overview I received of their operations. I encourage you to allocate some time each day, even if it's only five minutes, to get some practice in on the BSS system, so that you can test different work tasks and give feedback to your manager on what works or what doesn't. Overall, the trip was excellent, I was able to learn a little more about BSS and have some fun in the process.

Simply enter a word and you'll find example sentences using that word, related words, images tagged with that word, and statistics showing how common the word is. If you don't know how to pronounce a particular word, there are audio pronunciations or you can record your own. They even offer a comments section for you to share your love of words with the world. How do they do this? They've mined over four billion words of text and share whatever they've found. It not only is better than a traditional dictionary, it's free!

### Motions To Modify The Automatic Stay: Claim On, Claim Off

An Automatic Stay is received when the debtor files a bankruptcy case. This stay bars creditors from pursuing or collecting property while the debtor is in bankruptcy. In order to lift the stay, creditors go before the court and motion for permission to modify the Automatic Stay so that they can pursue or collect any collateral, usually on mortgages, vehicles, condo associations and evictions.

After the matter has been heard and an order is entered, Motions to lift the stay can have several outcomes, all of which can result in the claim for a particular creditor being turned on or turned off.

When the Stay Lift is related to a mortgage and the order is "Granted Stay Modified," the creditors usually ask that the claim be withdrawn, and this means the Trustee will turn off all related claims, including current mortgages as well as mortgage arrears, so that no disbursements go out. If there is no language in the order to withdraw the claim or to stop payments, the claim will remain on until the creditors withdraw their claim. When the Stay Lift is related to a vehicle, eviction and or condo association, the claim stays on unless the order specifically states to stop making payments.

When a stay has been lifted, but the terms of the order are still being negotiated by the parties involved, the case is docketed "Draft Order to Follow," and the claim in this instance will have the disbursement turned off until an order is entered to Agree (claim turned on) or Modify (claim turned off).

"Future Date Orders" modifying the stay allow additional time for issues to be resolved; usually the order comes into effect 14 days after the date the order is entered. The judge can also add an effective date. When an order results in the claim being modified and withdrawn, and the claim in question is still active, this claim is left on until the effective date of the order even if a disbursement is set to go out before the effective date. When an Order reinstates the stay, the claim will be turned on, on the effective date of the order.

Although many orders look alike and most use much of the same language, each order must be viewed individually and read carefully; doing this will insure that no specifics are missed and the order is processed correctly.

### By the Numbers: **Hurricanes**

There were 12 hurricanes during the 2010 Atlantic hurricane season, five of which were major hurricanes at Category 3-strength or higher.



- The Weather Bureau officially began naming hurricanes in 1950.
- In 2005, there were 28 named storms, making it the busiest season on record. This forced the first use of the alternate Greek alphabet scheme, which is used when the list of approved names runs out.
- The average number of named storms each season is six, with an average of two classified as major.
- There have been only three Category 5 hurricanes that have made landfall in the United States: the Labor Day Hurricane of 1935, Hurricane Camille in 1969, and Hurricane Andrew in 1992.



# Financial The Chapter 13 Payoff

A Chapter 13 case can be paid off before the completion of the confirmed plan as long as certain guidelines are met.

First, the claim bar dates should have passed. This is to ensure that all creditors have filed their claims and the true payoff amount can be determined.



The case has to be in a current status and not completed, dismissed, transferred or converted. The debtor's attorney, a lender or the debtor can request a payoff letter. If the debtor's attorney is requesting the payoff, then the bar dates should have passed before one can be issued. If a third-party or a lender is requesting the payoff, then the bar dates should have passed, and the debtor's signed authorization to release information must accompany the request. If the debtor is requesting the payoff, then the plan should have been confirmed for at least 36 months. If the 36 months has not passed, then the debtor's attorney or the lender can request the payoff on behalf of the debtor.

The form to request a payoff can be downloaded and printed from the trustee's website under the forms link. All requesters of a payoff must fill out this form and attach the necessary documentation and fax it to the trustee's office. The form asks for information on the debtor (name, case number and address), the person requesting the payoff and their contact information, if any creditors are to be excluded from the payoff amount, and if a payment history for the debtor is required.

The payoff statement can be printed from the trustee's database. There are three template letters to choose from depending on who the requester is. You can select payoff letter to debtor's attorney, payoff letter to lender and payoff letter to debtor. You fill in debtor's name, case number, the date the letter is being issued, the name of the requesting party and the payoff amount.

After reviewing the information, the letter can be faxed or mailed to the requesting party. A PDF of the letter is added to the correspondence folder for the case on the ECF File Server, and a docket entry is made in CaseNET stating a payoff letter was sent with the amount of the payoff. This is necessary so that anyone on phones can answer questions regarding the letter that was sent.

A copy of the payoff letter is also attached to the request and retained for reference.



## Effectively Communicating In Five Steps

Being able to communicate effectively is key to maintaining good relationships at home and at work. Consider these five ways to improve your communication skills.



### 1. Listen as much as you talk.

Communication involves more than just talking. Of course, when you are talking, the other person is listening. But if you stop listening while focusing on what you are going to say next, you break down this loop and make the conversation less effective. Focus on what the other person is saying. If you have trouble doing this, try mirroring their statements before you launch into your own. For example, you can reply, "You are saying that we need to have a schedule for taking out the trash" instead of just jumping in with reasons why the idea won't work.

### 2. Don't multitask.

In our over-connected world, it is tempting to check messages, surf the Internet, or even watch television when someone is trying to talk to you. To improve your communication, keep your multitasking to a minimum. Turn off the television and radio, put down the phone, and walk away from the computer.

### 3. Clarify often.

If you are confused by what the other person is saying, don't just forge ahead with the conversation. State that you need more information or clarification before jumping to conclusions. Ask questions if you need to or restate some of the other person's arguments.

### 4. Watch body language.

Instead of being a passive listener, watch for clues in body language to try to further understand. Someone who is frustrated or bored will often convey this using body language clues. Also watch yourself. You may find that you are displaying body language or a tone that goes against what you are trying to convey.

### 5. Handle those difficult situations.

If you find that your discussion is accelerating into an attack or is getting heated, it may be best to take a short break. Respond more slowly with some extra thought and look for common ground to get back on track.
